## **Malaspina Bicentenary**

2010 marks the bicentenary of the death in northern Tuscany of Alexandro Malaspina, and we are very pleased to hear that memorial celebrations are continuing in various parts of the world.

Dario Manfredi, President of the Malaspina Foundation in Mulazzo, has been giving a set of lectures on the navigator's life, and a new biography has been published in Italian.

*Alessandro Malaspina: una storia dimenticata*, by Beppe Foggini, published by Magenes (<u>www.magenes.it</u>), is now out. It will be launched officially in Rome on December 16<sup>th</sup>.

The AMRC welcomes a new student research assistant. Manuela Fahme, who will be working on translating the letters of Alexandro Malaspina and other documents written in Italian. Although Canadian, Ms. Fahme was born in Milan and has lived for the last ten years in Padua, graduating from the University of Venice. She is currently in the MBA program at Vancouver Island University, and brings a thorough grasp of European languages to her new position.

We have also been informed of some progress in the Malaspina 2010 project, in which two research vessels will ply the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans in search of evidence about the effects of climate change on marine organisms and ocean chemistry. After repeated delays, the vessel Hespérides will leave Cadiz on December 15<sup>th</sup>. A variety of associated events are in progress: see the website: www.expedicionmalaspina.es/.
